

Community-based mentoring programme: Community-based mentoring helps young people to increase their confidence, develop a greater sense of belonging and aspire to greatness. The majority of the young people who come through the **Big Brothers Big Sisters** programme are looking for positive adult role models outside of their existing support structure. A young person

aged 6-11 is matched with an adult volunteer based on personality, shared interests, and geographic location. Once a week, for a minimum of a year, the mentor meets with the young person to spend time together – cooking, going to the beach, playing sport – the possibilities are endless......

THIRTY YEARS OF U3A TARADALE

Chris Geddis kindly reminds us that *U3A Taradale* was established thirty years ago! Background:

In 1972, Professor Pierre Vellas - and colleagues of Toulouse University in France - recognised the pool of experience, knowledge, and intelligence of retired people. The following year, they launched the *U3A* (L'Université du Troisième Age – the University of the Third Age). Eight years later, there were sixty such organisations in France. In the "French Model", each *U3A* maintains strong links with a university and is based on attending lectures. Thus, we are not a "University" in the modern sense of the word. The guiding philosophy of most New Zealand *U3A*s is that stated in 1981 by one of our founders in the UK, the late Professor Peter Laslett of Cambridge University:

"Those who teach shall also learn and those that learn shall also teach"

Under New Zealand law, we cannot use "University" in our title as it reserved for the current University qualification establishments.

In the January 1994 Minutes of Taradale U3A, it is recorded that the New Zealand Qualifications Authority wrote drawing attention to the 'legal protection of the word "University" and asking U3As to desist in its use in promotional literature. If we choose not to observe this, they will regard it as an offence under law.

Therefore, we could no longer call ourselves University of Third Age - hence U3A is the name currently used in New Zealand. Franki James has suggested that, instead of having to explain the acronym each time we are asked, we might like to call ourselves the "Universal Third Age" instead.

The U3A has spread world-wide – to the UK in the early 80s where it became more of a self-help organisation, to Australia in 1985, then to New Zealand in 1989 (at Remuera in Auckland) and it has since spread throughout the country. New Zealand has followed the so-called "British Model".

Meetings were held in 1992 to form a U3A in Hawkes Bay, with the intention of one U3A covering branches in Havelock North, Hastings, Napier and Taradale as U3A Hawke's Bay Incorporated. However, Havelock North chose to be incorporated separately.

The first group in Taradale to meet was Antiques in November 1992 closely followed by Current Affairs. A report in the HB Herald Tribune on 7 November 1992 stated:

"A U3A in Taradale opens next week with twenty members. In Havelock North, forty members have enrolled although courses have yet to be finalised".

On 25th August in 1993, when Hastings had twenty-seven members, Napier twenty-one and Taradale forty-four, they were incorporated as branches under U3A Hawke's Bay Incorporated.

In 1993, Taradale U3A's forty-four financial members were engaged in six active study groups: Antiques, Comparative Religions, Creative English, Ancient History, Modern History and Current Affairs.

By 1994, Taradale U3A had sixty-three members in twelve groups: Ancient and Modern History, Scottish History, Pencil Sketching, Local History, Coastal Navigation, Comparative Religions, Creative English, Geology, Watercolour Art, Antiques and the ever-popular Current Affairs.

Hastings U3A incorporated separately in 2001, which left Taradale U3A as both a branch and the parent body as Napier had merged with them by then.

On 2nd July 2002 the Constitution of the U3A Hawke's Bay Incorporated was altered and re-named as, U3A Taradale Incorporated.

On 13th November 2002 a lunch was held at the Taradale Club, costing \$16.50 a head, to commemorate the ten years since the first meetings of U3A groups in Taradale. In 2003, the Napier Secondary Schools' Speech Contest was started as part of the tenth anniversary celebrations, and it continued for about 15 years.

On 6th June 2012, a lunch was held at the Napier Golf Club to commemorate twenty years since the first meetings of U3A groups in Taradale. On 25th August 2018, a lunch at the Napier RSA to commemorate twenty-five years of U3A Taradale was held.

Chris wonders why nothing was done to celebrate thirty years of U3A Taradale. *Editor's note: Perhaps Covid and Cyclone Gabrielle had something to do with it?*

Christmas Party New Honorary Life Member of *U3A Taradale*

At the start of the *U3A Taradale* Christmas Party on 4th December 2023, hosted by members of the *History* group, President Keith announced that, in addition to our two existing Honorary Life Members – Vic Chick and Sonia Mackenzie - a third member, Eric Niania, had been appointed. Eric was introduced by Vic, after which he was presented with a special certificate which, it later transpired, he himself had designed some long time before!

Eric then gave the following acceptance speech:

"Upon retiring from a career year of about forty years as schoolteachers in the Waikato and Auckland regions, my late wife Ramari and I felt the call to return to our provincial *turangawaewae* (places where we feel empowered and connected), Hawkes Bay; she originally from Nuhaka and I, from Te Reinga.

The year 2000 and Taradale seemed a favourable compromise for us both; so, we decided Taradale would be a god place to settle.

Now, all of you in this hall will know, that retiring is not a matter of watching the sun making its way across the sky, day after tedious day and thus, being interested people doing interesting things, we both wanted to make use of those hours.

It was then that I discovered in the *Napier City Council* brochure, "Interesting things to do". I scrolled down the list and the U3A organisation popped up. This was the first time I had heard about such an organisation. I soon joined U3A Taradale - about the year 2000.

There are many, many reasons why the *U3A* is so very meaningful for me.

There is a very profound saying in the *Māori* world which typifies the spirit of *U3A*:

'He aha te mea nui o te ao? He tangata! He tangata!'

'What is the most important thing in this world?

'Tis people! people! people!'

U3A has flushed out of me my Māori origins and has led me into the cultural world of the Pakeha. Through the U3A I have met and befriended many people and I like to think that today is a testament to that recognition.

There was **Shirley Round**; for me, Shirley was probably the most catalytic member to set my sparks of enthusiasm alight. Shirley, a retired secondary school teacher, was our *History* Convenor. As a result of Shirley, I was nominated (by default) onto the Committee. She certainly pushed me into giving talks in the *History* group. I owe a lot to Shirley for boosting my confidence and for treating me as an equal.

Space does not allow for the inclusion of so many friendly people in *U3A* who have bothered to help and share their favourable time with me:

- Vic Chick our go-to for legal matters;
- Margaret Hicks fun-loving, efficient and a great leader.
- **Doug Kerr** close friend with more than a passing interest in the world of the *Māori*.
- Drew Keffalas such a loyal and close friend who worked tirelessly for U3A
- **Dick Smithies** very intelligent friend who was the ideal member to convene *Controversial Issues*.
- **Pat Ballard** a real giver, loyal President, who took over from **Belinda Galbraith** as Convenor of *Community Affairs*. Pat and I still trade oranges for spinach!
- **Norma Sinton** long-serving member of the *History* group and her Dad was my Headmaster at the *Te Reinga Native School*.
- Franki James Just the kind of person ideally suited to the functions of *U3A*. Franki took over from me as Convener of the *Napier Secondary Schools' Speech Competition*. Oh! there are so many others who have touched my life as a *U3A* member. In finishing, I still take *U3A Māori* lessons with a very diligent group. They are so keen and

hardly need any prompting!

'He aha te mea nui o te ao? He tangata! He tangata! He tangata!' Following Eric's speech, Sonia read a poem she had specially written for the festive occasion:

Good morning fellow members, it's great to see you here Especially when the Christmas season is so very near.
I almost can't remember how many times I've been To an end-of-year celebration with my friends of U3A.
Twenty-five years plus we started up as a friendly bunch All have learnt a thing or two about a subject that is new... and this is what you are meant to do.

Each year the list of things to study grows bigger, better and more widely-spread to keep our members right in touch and make the lot be widely-read.

Meeting for lunch to keep them fed, learning of the taste of wines, which is best of white and red.

Music fills the hearts of many. History keeps the mind so steady, Words forefront in several ways can fill up a lot of days.

But let's not forget that Christmas comes just once a year,
And, once again, it's almost here!
I'm sure that once is all it comes but maybe I cannot do sums.
So, I want to say "thank you" for the year that has gone by,
For the friendship and the laughter that has come into my life
Just from being a member of the U3A.
So, pretend to raise a glass up now and shout out "Merry Christmas!"
We'll see you back in '24 with renewed enthusiasm.
