UPDATE ON THE COMMITTEE

The committee is buzzing along well. Yvonne Huckson has taken over the task of minutes secretary. We will be seeking a replacement treasurer as Christine Smith has had to resign from the role because of added family responsibilities supporting a family member sadly affected by long covid. We will miss her wisdom and efficiency. Jeanette Elgie will be acting treasurer until our annual meeting.

- 1. We remind members that Taradale U3A members can attend courses belonging to the Hastings and Havelock North clubs. You can learn of these through their web sites. Membership in any of the Hawkes Bay clubs includes access to the groups in each of the three clubs. We have found the newly instituted occasional informal meeting between presidents and other officers of the three Hawkes Bay U3A's to be helpful.
- 2. A reminder that our groups all operate under the U3A umbrella so that each member of a group should be a financial member of Taradale U3A.
- 3. We've clarified <u>the process for the collection of subs at the beginning of each year.</u> An invoice type letter will be sent out with the January newsletter. Those who do not pay within a short period will be approached through the convenor of groups they belong to. A reminder note will be sent to those who have not been able to pay by March. Those who have not paid by 30 June will be deleted from membership including membership of groups they may attend. For those who may have difficulty paying or processing a payment using internet banking, consult your group convenor.
- 4. We agreed to publicise courses run by SeniorNet who organise courses on computer and mobile phone skills for folk of our age and stage. We share with them a commitment to retired and elderly people having sufficient computer skills to function well in our technological society.
- 5. Dates for 2023: **Town Hall Meetings for 2023:**1 February **AGM**, 3 May, 6 September, 6 December.
- 6. Some members have received scam phone calls claiming to be connected with U3A. How do we recognise a scam call?

<u>Signs of a scam call</u>: calls that are unexpected; contact from businesses you don't know; unprompted calls from businesses you deal with; requesting to access your phone or computer remotely; asking you to download software; wanting you to lie or withhold information; pressuring you to act fast; asking you to move money out of your account.

<u>What to do next</u>: Hang up and end the call; call the company back on an official phone number (don't request a call back); never share your on-line banking passwords; don't give out personal information; be careful sharing verification codes unless you're sure.

From our Groups:

CONTENTIOUS ISSUES GROUP

Are you familiar with the 'Doctrine of Discovery' issued by Pope Alexander VI in 1493? In a time when Papal power was politically significant it gave to European explorers the right to lay claim to land they 'discovered' that was not populated by Christians. Such land was regarded as being 'vacant' and able to be claimed as the possession of the 'discovering' nation. Of course, the 'discovered' land had never been lost – it was inhabited by people who loved it, lived in it and in whose fields grew their food. Their one 'crime' was that they lived on land wanted by a more powerful invader.

This pernicious doctrine enabled British settlers to Australia to describe that continent as 'Terra Nullius', uninhabited, even though the indigenous people had lived there for thousands of years. The idea contained in this 1493 Papal Bull helped shape the attitudes of those who built the great European Empires, including the British Empire, in the eighteenth, nineteenth and twentieth centuries: the dreadful notion that those who do not agree with me and my cultural and religious views do not really exist and have no right to have what I and my government want! Though first applied in South America views like this have caused havoc in most parts of the world. You may know that on the 21st May 1840 William Hobson, in the name of Queen Victoria, proclaimed that Queen Victoria, <u>'on the grounds of discovery'</u>, asserted 'her sovereign rights over the Southern Islands of New Zealand, commonly called the 'Middle Island', and 'Stewarts's Island'; and the Island, commonly called 'The Northern Island', having been ceded in sovereignty (by a treaty) to Her Majesty.

There is so much we have inherited from the past that needs to be unravelled and put right. The group discussing the Doctrine of Discovery were grateful for the member who had chosen the topic and were left with plenty of questions, loose ends and personal reflections.

A little history...

THE EARLY DAYS OF U3A TARADALE

One of the obituaries in the last newsletter reminded me of how little of the early days of U3A *Taradale* seems to be known by many present-day members.

U3A Hawke's Bay was incorporated under the *Incorporated Societies Act 1908* on 25 August 1993. It consisted of two branches - Hastings and Taradale. The first meeting was of the *Antiques* group in October that year.

I joined U3A Hawke's Bay in 1996 and many groups were running, including Antiques, which has run continuously since then. In 1997 Hastings members of the U3A Hawke's Bay committee raised the question of incorporating separately. It was agreed in 1998 and, in 1999, Hastings U3A Incorporation was approved. Taradale was left as U3A Hawke's Bay and as a branch and so amendments to the Constitution were drafted and approved by the Taradale membership in 2000. The late Peter Newby, as Secretary, was of great assistance to me in the drafting of the Constitution and gaining its approval.

Jean Merrick's obituary refers to the start of the *Community Affairs* group. When my late wife, Connie, and I joined *U3A Hawke's Bay*, we attended an *International Affairs* group led by a gentleman from *Havelock North U3A*. He later decided to pursue other avenues and the group closed. That led to a discussion between Merle Killington, Jean Merrick, my wife and myself about a group to fill the gap and, thus, *Community Affairs* began. Merle was already coordinating two groups and was unwilling to take on anymore, Jean also declined, so Connie undertook the task. Merle and Jean agreed to organise morning tea. The group first met in *McDonald House* in the *Devonshire Place Mission* establishment; numbering initially about twelve members but quickly reaching about thirty. We then required a larger room and moved to the hall in the *Friendship Centre*. After organising the meetings for a few years, Connie passed the task to Pat Ballard.

My most outstanding memory of the early days of *Community Affairs* was the arrival of the speaker from the Fire Service - complete with Fire Appliance and full crew.

AVERAGE LIFE EXPECTANCY FOR NEW ZEALANDERS

Since the beginning of civilization, senior citizens have played an essential role in society. Historically, they have represented wisdom, earned through a lifetime filled with experience. 

A NEW BOOK...

'Wounded World and Broken Church', published by our president, Keith Rowe

The text below comes from the back cover of the book which will be available from Wardini Books in Napier from mid-December.

'Proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favourable or unfavourable.'

(2 Timothy 4:2.)

The times may not seem favourable for the church or its preaching but Keith Rowe is in no doubt that the Way pioneered by Jesus represents values and wisdom greatly needed in our troubled times.

Wounded World and Broken Church is a collection of sermons and reflections by someone who is deeply sensitive to the troubled times in which we live and who seeks to bridge the gap between thoughtful scholarship and lived life.

We cannot deny the troubles facing churches that once offered hope and direction to society: decline in numbers, the demise of Christendom, the indifference of secular society, captivity to economic and social forces that deny the very Gospel that gave it birth. The church is broken, in need of deep healing.

This selection of contemporary reflections offers a little light in what is a difficult time for our fragile planet and a human community shaped by violence, greed and social dislocation. Climate change and environmental destruction, the continuing and growing gap between rich and poor, fresh awareness of human fragility revealed during covid pandemic times, the perils and promise of technological change, all cry out for fresh thinking and bold and imaginative action. These and other challenges are the setting for our believing, praying and living.

Wounded World and Broken Church offers encouragement to those who have become disenchanted with versions of Christian believing and living that are no longer credible and to congregational leaders trapped into churchly roles they feel require them to give assent to ancient convictions they no longer agree with.

No one knows what the future form of the church will be. Keith Rowe asserts that though the form 'church' takes in the future is unclear humanity needs groups of people who recall, explore, live within and share the words and deeds of Jesus – people who live in the wilderness in the spirit of Jesus, trusting that within the love of God, their efforts, their prayers, their struggle contribute to the healing of the church and the world.

This is the challenge to us who preach, believe, live in these unfavourable times.

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Rev. Dr Keith Rowe has degrees in history and in theology, including a doctorate in theology from San Franctsco Theological Seminary. He was ordained by the Methodist Church in New Zealand and served for thirth years as Parish Minister, Theological Collegie. Lecturer and Principal. He transferred to the Uniting Church in Australia, served in two Sydney partishes and was chair of the Assembly Doctime Commission.
